FIVCO: Pathways Region 10.

- Boyd/Greenup Counties P.U.S.H is continuing to meet at the Bellefonte Center.
 - Bellefonte Hospital has referred over 5 cases to children's and Kentucky Peer Support Services.
 - We recently had 12 youth and parent leaders attend the Leadership Academy with KPFC. This was held in Ashland.
 - We are planning our 8th Parent Retreat this September, it will be at Camp Lyons in Salt Lick. At the moment we have filled all our rooms and have a waiting list.
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- Lawrence County Grandparent support group will be changing times, no dates have been set to accommodate a better schedule for families.
- Elliott County has their P.U.S.H up and going. The Parent representative has now been hired as a Family Peer Support Specialist. The group is growing and continues to be well perceived with the community.
- Our FPSS from Elliott County and Boyd County attended the Kentucky School for Alcohol and Substances.
- Carter County has a parent that attended the Leadership Academy and is on her way to become our Parent Rep for Carter County. She plans on attending the CCT this fall to become a FPSS.

- Carter County P.U.S.H. is moving and growing every month. We have had several parents in the group that has been stepping up and wanting to assist with leading a session. They are helping each other with resources as well.
 - The FPSS attended Boyd, Carter, Elliott and Ashland's Back to school Festivals. There were a lot of parents that attended to receive assistants for their children's school needs. And some parents have checked in with the FPSS and stated that they did not get half of what was needed. We are working to find extra supplies for these families.
 - The FPSS has attended two school meetings in the past week. With several more scheduled for this next

week. We have several parents seeking resources and assistance for their children to have testing done to see if they qualify for IEP/504"s.



Pete Earley

Mental health advocate, author and journalist, Pete Earley is best known for his nonfiction book, *CRAZY: A Father's Search Through America's Mental Health Madness*, which was one of two finalists for the 2007 Pulitzer Prize. (The word *CRAZY* in the title refers to our current mental health system, which Earley shows in his book to be deeply flawed.)

CRAZY describes Earley's struggle to get his adult son helped after he develops a severe mental illness. Instead of treatment, his son was arrested. Outraged, Earley spent nine months as a reporter inside the Miami Dade County jail to discover why jails and prisons have become America's *de facto* mental asylums.

His book has won awards from the American Psychiatric Association, the National Alliance on Mental Illness, Mental Health America, and prompted CNN to name him one of the nation's top "Mental Wellness Warriors."

A former reporter for *The Washington Post*, he is the author

of eleven nonfiction books and five novels, including four New York Times bestsellers. His book *Family of Spies: Inside the John Walker Spy Ring*, was a five hour miniseries shown on CBS television. For his book, *The Hot House: Life Inside Leavenworth Prison*, Earley spent a full year as a reporter inside a maximum-security prison. His book, *Circumstantial Evidence*, won a Robert F. Kennedy award describing the framing of an innocent black man sent to Alabama's death row.

Earley has testified five times before the U.S. Congress about the need for mental health reforms and has lectured in four foreign countries. He serves on the board of the Corporation for Supportive Housing, which finances projects to eliminate homelessness. The Chief Justice of the Virginia Supreme Court appointed him to a task force that recommended changes to the state's involuntary commitment laws after a horrific shooting on the campus of Virginia Tech University.

He recently revealed that a black woman with mental illness being held in a Virginia jail died after being repeatedly stunned by guards with a taser and he has written numerous articles about another inmate who starved to death in jail waiting for a state hospital bed.

He writes regularly for USA TODAY and the Washington Post as well as a mental health blog that averages 71,000 readers at www.petearley.com.

In a *Washingtonian Magazine* cover story entitled, *Top Journalists: Washington's Media Elite*, he was described as one of a handful of journalists in America who "have the power to introduce new ideas and give them currency."



TIMELINE OF ACTIVITIES (August 2015 – July 2016)

AUGUST

CHES Solutions Groups was retained as consultants for RIAC programming

SEPTEMBER

Five (previously scheduled) regional forums held across the state

- Resistance to and mistrust of transition
- Varying degrees of understanding of new functions
- Frustration with amount of time without specific information



MARCH

LRC Peer Group Meeting

- Included RIAC chairs
- Some LRCs demonstrated varying degrees of resistance to and mistrust of transition, while other LRCs demonstrated willingness to move forward

OCTOBER – MAY

CHES visited all RIACS to begin strategic planning process

- Continued and varying degrees of resistance and mistrust of transition
- Varying degrees of understanding of new functions and continued role/purpose of RIAC, SIAC, and SIAC sub-committees
- Lack of communication flowing from LRCs to RIAC members
- Initial plans representative of individuality of team needs and comfort
- CHES followed up with DBHDID regarding specific problem areas as well as champions

MARCH - JULY

CHES second round visits scheduled

- Second visits to Bluegrass East, Bluegrass West, Southern Bluegrass, Northern Kentucky and Cumberland Valley
- Time spent reviewing progress, discussing next steps and helping to connect new functions with RIAC mission
- Notable progress in shift from case specific to global thinking

JUNE

LRC Peer Group Meeting

- RIAC chairs once again included
- LRCs and chairs all reported success toward or resulting from new functions

JULY – NOVEMBER

CHES scheduled to visit all remaining RIACs a second time
